



Where will my child attend kindergarten?

What kinds of programs do PSD elementary schools offer?

When can my child start kindergarten?

Children must be 5 years old on or before Oct. 1 of the respective school year to register for kindergarten.

What are the benefits of kindergarten in PSD?

Kindergarten is a time for your child to establish a love of lifelong learning. Students who attend kindergarten learn social and communication skills, build early literacy and math skills, gain independence, build friendships and hone playing and sharing skills.

Are meals provided for students?

Yes – Colorado public schools now offer nutritious school meals free of charge for all children, regardless of family income.

Three Things to Work on With Your Incoming Kindergartener

Identify SOME letters of the alphabet.

Note that we did not say all letters - just some. Flash cards are great for this exercise (see our printable on the next page).

Recognize common sight words.

Mastering sight words not only helps students learn to read quickly, it also gives them confidence in their abilities. Start with common sight words such as, "and" and "me." Print and cut our sight worksheet to help your little one along in this process.

SOME THINGS TO PRACTICE

- 1. Read books together
- 2. Have your student name what they notice on each page
- 3. Writing first and last name
- 4. Using a glue stick
- 5. Holding a pencil
- 6. Using scissors
- Go on a shape hunt and have your student point out the shapes they see
- 8. Using words that describe size (small, smaller, smallest, etc.)
- 9. Using positional words (up, down, behind, next to, etc.)
- Go on a number hunt and have your student point out all the numbers they see



SOME THINGS TO PRACTICE

- 1. Putting on a coat and zipping it up
- 2. Tying shoelaces
- 3. Packing up a backpack and wearing it
- 4. Opening and closing snack and lunch containers
- 5. Washing hands and using the bathroom independently
- 6. Discussing how your student will be getting to and from school
- Ensuring your student can follow basic two-step instructions such as, "Get your lunchbox and put it in your backpack"
- 8. Hanging up their backpack
- 9. Sharpening a pencil
- 10. Opening and filling a water bottle

Counting Down to Kindergarten

Here are some activities to help your child get ready and excited for kindergarten!

Practice new routines

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, five- and six-year-olds need 10 to 11 hours of sleep each night. Here are some tips to help with the transition:

- Have set wake-up and sleep times each day.
- Lengthen the day without naps there is no nap time in full-day kindergarten, and your child needs to be prepared for a longer day.
- Drive, walk or ride the new route to school.
- Discuss the new school schedule and expectations for eating, playing, learning and other classroom activities.
- Go to the library to check out children's books that talk about kindergarten ("The Night Before Kindergarten," "Ms. Bindergarten Gets Ready for Kindergarten" and others).

Consider logistical changes

- Will your child need to leave earlier or later in the morning?
- Will there be a bus? Will you drive or walk to school?
- How will Kindergarten change your family's existing schedule?

Start a "countdown" calendar to the first day of Kindergarten

Once preschool/daycare is out for the summer, build excitement for the first day of Kindergarten:

- Make a paper chain representing the days until school begins.
- Remove a link each day to make the passage of time real to your child.
- Or, use a calendar and mark off each day with the first day of school highlighted with fun colors, shapes and/or stickers.



Learning at Home

Children begin learning at home. You and your family are the first people in your child's life to:

- Appreciate who they are
- Encourage curiosity
- Communicate family values
- Establish a strong foundation for learning that lasts a lifetime

Young children are more likely to thrive in school when they...

- Know many words
- Can express their ideas and needs

Spending time talking and playing with your child...

- Increases their vocabulary
- Makes them feel good about themselves
- Helps them begin school eager and ready to learn

ACTIVITY BREAK:

Once Upon a Time

You can help your children learn to express themselves and communicate.

This is a simple and fun activity that you can do anytime, anywhere. Young children are still captivated by storytime, so try one of these:

- Tell a story about yourself when you were their age
- Talk about your grandparents and some of the things you would do with them when you were a child
- Ask your child to tell you a story
- Have a joke-telling contest to see how hard you can make each other laugh!

Additional Activities

Here are some fun things you and your child can do together.

ACTIVITY BREAK:

I Spy

You can play this anywhere: while shopping, driving or reading the newspaper.

- Pick a letter from your child's name and see if you can find it.
- Pick a color and see if you can find an object in that same color.
- Pick a number and have your child find that many items.

ACTIVITY BREAK:

Draw or Write

Drawing and scribbling are the beginning stages of writing. Drawing helps develop fine motor skills and imagination, and it's fun for children to share their "stories" with you.

- Have your child "write" their own shopping list, even if it is just scribbling.
- Ask them to draw what they think Kindergarten will be like, and then have them explain it to you.

ACTIVITY BREAK:

I Can Read


For a fun outing, head to the library and let your child pick out a few books to "read" either there or at home.

- Snuggle up and ask them to "read" the book to you by explaining what they see and what they think they are reading.
- After they're done, read the book to them, taking time to let them point out pictures and ask questions.
- When you're done reading, ask them to flip to their favorite part of the book. Have them explain why they liked that part, and then share your favorite part of the book.
